

July 17: Philemon

We see this week that the book of Philemon focuses on the idea of radical forgiveness and ultimately, reconciliation.

Describe a time when you were given a second chance at something (a task, a relationship, etc). What did this mean to you?

Recall a time when you or someone you know played the role of a reconciler, approaching someone on behalf of another person. Describe the approach that was taken.

Would you say you are quick to forgive? What is an area of life or a type of "wrong" where you find it most difficult to forgive?

Read aloud Colossians 3:11-17.

After reviewing this passage in Colossians, discuss what someone who "lets the peace of Christ rule in their heart" looks like.

How do you need to see all relationships through a gospel lens this week? Take a moment to pray through the weekly prayer focus, below.

Heavenly Father, help me to be a friend to others who is **FORGIVING**

Read Luke 17:3

Thank God that he always forgives you when you repent – even though you sin against him far more than "seven times in a day" (v.4). Pray that you would be a friend who forgives – who decides to love, to act, and to pray as though a wrong had never been committed. Is there another Christian you're withholding forgiveness from? Ask for a spirit of true forgiveness.

ESERMON PASSAGE

Philemon (ESV)

¹Paul, a prisoner for Christ Jesus, and Timothy our brother, To Philemon our beloved fellow worker ² and Apphia our sister and Archippus our fellow soldier, and the church in your house: ³Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

⁴I thank my God always when I remember you in my prayers, ⁵ because I hear of your love and of the faith that you have toward the Lord Jesus and for all the saints, ⁶ and I pray that the sharing of your faith may become effective for the full knowledge of every good thing that is in us for the sake of Christ. ⁷ For I have derived much joy and comfort from your love, my brother, because the hearts of the saints have been refreshed through you.

⁸Accordingly, though I am bold enough in Christ to command you to do what is required, ⁹yet for love's sake I prefer to appeal to you—I, Paul, an old man and now a prisoner also for Christ Jesus— 10 I appeal to you for my child, Onesimus, whose father I became in my imprisonment. 11 (Formerly he was useless to you, but now he is indeed useful to you and to me.) 12 I am sending him back to you, sending my very heart. ¹³ I would have been glad to keep him with me, in order that he might serve me on your behalf during my imprisonment for the gospel, ¹⁴ but I preferred to do nothing without your consent in order that your goodness might not be by compulsion but of your own accord. ¹⁵ For this perhaps is why he was parted from you for a while, that you might have him back forever, ¹⁶ no longer as a bondservant but more than a bondservant, as a beloved brother—especially to me, but how much more to you, both in the flesh and in the Lord. ¹⁷ So if you consider me your partner, receive him as you would receive me. 18 If he has wronged you at all, or owes you anything, charge that to my account. ¹⁹ I, Paul, write this with my own hand: I will repay it—to say nothing of your owing me even your own self. 20 Yes, brother, I want some benefit from you in the Lord. Refresh my heart in Christ. ²¹ Confident of your obedience, I write to you, knowing that you will do even more than I say. ²² At the same time, prepare a guest room for me, for I am hoping that through your prayers I will be graciously given to you.

²³ Epaphras, my fellow prisoner in Christ Jesus, sends greetings to you, ²⁴ and so do Mark, Aristarchus, Demas, and Luke, my fellow workers. ²⁵ The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit.
